## **HUD Announces Flat Rent Change**

All public housing residents who selected to pay a flat rent for their dwelling instead of having rent based on their income may see a change in their monthly rent. This change will take effect at the time of their recertification. At their recertification, residents will be given the opportunity to continue paying flat rent or select income-based rent. Each Greensboro Housing Authority (GHA) management office will work with residents to determine which rental option may be best for them. Residents who currently pay a monthly rent based on their income should only see a change if their income changes.

As part of the 2014 Consoli-



dated Appropriations Act, approved by Congress and signed by the President in January, all public housing agencies are required to establish a flat rental amount at levels no lower than 80% of an area's fair market rent. Fair market rent is determined by the average rent that is charged in a particular area. The current fair market rent

for Guilford County for a two -bedroom home is \$709. The flat market rent would be 80% of the fair market rent which is \$567 per month. Flat rents are adjusted to reflect whether utilities are paid by the tenant or the housing authority.

For tenants whose flat market rent increase will be more than 35%, the new rental amount will be phased in over a period of time.

It is estimated that 109 of the 2,209 households residing in GHA's public housing will be affected by the change. Sixteen households may see a decrease in their monthly rent and 93 may see an increase.

## Art Workshops Held

Thirty-nine children who live in Greensboro's public housing communities or whose families are housing choice voucher recipients attended art workshops taught by staff from the African-American Atelier (AAA). The workshops, a collaboration between the AAAand Greensboro Housing Authority (GHA), helped the young participants see art in a different The children were

taught the technical aspects of art using various drawing techniques, mediums, complimentary colors and the use of unity and proportion to produce works of art.

As the workshops progressed, children were encouraged to use their new talents to create posters for Housing America's "What Home Means to Me" poster contest. Forty posters were entered for the annual con-

test and staff from the AAA selected four winners in elementary, middle school and high school age groups.

This is the third year that GHA has partnered with the AAA to offer art classes to its youth. The Atelier hosts an annual art gallery during Housing America Month in October that features all the posters submitted by GHA youth for the "What Home Means to Me" poster contest.

## Tornado and Hurricane Safety



Prepare a disaster kit for any emergency including canned food and can opener; first aid kit and essential medications; three gallons of water per person; protective clothing, rainwear and bedding or sleeping bags; a battery-powered radio,

> flashlight and extra batteries; special items for infants, the elderly and disabled family members.

gather if a dangerous storm is headed your way. It
could be your

basement or, if there is no basement, a center hallway, bathroom, or closet on the lowest floor. If you are in a high-rise, you may not have enough time to go to the lowest floor. Pick a place in a hallway in the center of the building.

warnings. Listen to your local radio and TV stations for updated storm information. Know what a storm watch and warning means: A tornado/hurricane watch means a violent storm is possible, a warning means a storm has been spotted and may be headed for your area. Go to safety

immediately.

- If a WATCH is issued. Listen to local radio and TV stations for further updates. Be alert to changing weather conditions. Blowing debris or the sound of an approaching tornado may alert you.
- ♦ If a WARNING is issued. If you are inside, go to the safe place you picked to protect yourself from flying debris. If you are outside, hurry to a nearby sturdy building for safety or lie flat in a ditch or low-lying area. If you are in a car or mobile home, get out immediately and head for safety.


