Foxworth Grand Opening



Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting ceremonies for Foxworth Condominiums attracted a large group May 6, including Congressman Brad Miller.

Following the program, attendees toured two apartments including a first-floor, handicap-accessible apartment and a third-floor apartment featuring a walkout balcony-- to rave reviews.

The two-bedroom, 1,100 to 1,130-square-foot apartments include a laundry room; open-concept living room and kitchen; a breakfast bar; nine-foot ceilings; energy-efficient HVAC systems; central air; security and sprinkler systems; Energy Star appliances including a stove, refrigerator and dishwasher; a garbage disposal and custom blinds.

The acquisition of Foxworth began in 2009 with the purchase of 14 foreclosed condominiums located in two, three-story buildings and a developed building pad for future construction. Another six condominiums, located in the original buildings, were purchased from individual homeowners. Last year, work began adding two new buildings with 12 condominiums each to the community and was completed on March 31, 2011. Foxworth Condominiums now provides affordable apartments for 44 families through GHA's public housing program.

The Neighborhood Stabilization Program, which funded the project, was developed in response to the high foreclosure rate that has gripped the country. It provides emergency assistance to state and local governments to

acquire and redevelop foreclosed properties that might otherwise be sources of abandonment and blight within their communities.

Time to Register Children for School

If you have a child who will be attending kindergarten or a school in the Guilford County School System, now is the time to get them registered for the coming school year, which begins Aug. 25.

School offices are open Monday through Thursday from 8 am to 5 pm. If you are uncertain where your child should attend or have questions, please contact the Student Assignment Office at 336-370-8303.

Also, if your child will be riding the bus to school, you must complete a Transportation Request Form and send it to the GCS Transportation Department at 131 Franklin Blvd., Greensboro NC 27401. Forms--which are available in English, Spanish, Arabic, Vietnamese and French--can be found online at http://www.gcsnc.com/dept/trans or by calling the Bus Transportation Office at 336-370-8920.

Here's what your child will need to register for school:

- A certified birth certificate
- Immunization record, including up-to-date Tdap vaccination for rising sixth graders
- A copy of the most recent report card or school transcript (if available)
- Proof of address in ONE of the following forms:
- 1. Original gas, oil, water or electric bill (Telephone and cable bills are not acceptable)
- 2. Official lease agreement
- 3. Driver's license and voter registration card
- 4. Driver's license and car registration
- 5. Driver's license and letter from employer on company letterhead verifying address
- 6. Driver's license or voter registration card and Medicaid card

An up-to-date Tdap vaccination, which is available from a family doctor or at the Guilford County Department of Public Health, is important since it protects children from tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough).

If you need to schedule an appointment for a vaccination at the Department of Public Health, please call them at 336-641-3245. The Department is located at 1100 E. Wendover Avenue in Greensboro and at 501 E. Green Drive in High Point.

"First Tee" Teaches More Than Just Golf

Along with fundamentals of the game, they also taught the "nine core values" -- responsibility, honesty, perseverance, confidence, judgment, integrity, sportsmanship, courtesy and respect.

When eight GHA youth decided earlier this year to participate in "The First Tee of the Triad Golf Program," they expected to learn the fundamentals of golf.

But, they finished learning more about the fundamentals of life.

In addition to swing coaching, putting drills, interactive games and exercises, the youth got a crash course in the "nine core values"—responsibility, honesty, perseverance, confidence, judgment, integrity, courtesy, sportsmanship and respect. It was all a part of the Golf Program's goal "to impact the lives of young people in the Piedmont Triad area of North Carolina by providing educational programs that promote life skills, character development and life-enhancing values through the game of golf."

Each week for six weeks, local golf professionals and members of the UNC-Greensboro golf team worked with the youth in a whirlwind of activity that culminated in a trip to Gillespie Golf Course for a "teaching round."

Each of the youth completed a written assessment test, as well as passing the life-skills challenge and golf-skills evaluation to win a set of clubs, golf bag and golf balls.

Efficient Use of Air Conditioning Saves \$\$\$

On hot and humid summer days, air conditioning is one of life's great pleasures.

But, if you're not using it efficiently, it can also be one of your biggest expenses.

We've all heard horror stories of people who open windows instead of adjusting the thermostat when rooms get too cold. But, did you know that turning off the air conditioning and opening windows for a couple of days or so during a cool spell will actually cost you money instead of saving it? That's because one of the jobs of an air conditioner is to dehumidify the air. By opening windows, rooms re-humidify and the air conditioner must work to dehumidify them once again.

Here's a few more cost-saving tips for efficient air conditioning.

- Keep all doors and windows closed when the A/C is on, and pull drapes, blinds and shades over windows facing the sun.
- Keep your air conditioning vents in mind when you arrange furniture. Avoid placing large pieces of furniture directly in front of or on top of vents.
- If there is a room that is not being used, close the door to the room rather than trying to close the A/C vent in the room.
- Plan "hot work" (such as washing and drying clothes, baking, cooking, etc.) for the cooler hours of the day, either early morning or evening.
